The Choir:

Intervention Team: The Zones of Regulation

This term the intervention team have been working throughout the school to introduce a new curriculum about emotional regulation called the Zones of Regulation. This is being taught in every class, with staff supporting its rollout.

The Zones of Regulation is a curriculum designed to support understanding of self-regulation and emotional control. There are four zones which are colour coded; blue, green, yellow and red, and emotions are categorised into each zone.

The curriculum's learning activities support the students to learn how to use strategies or 'tools' to move from one zone to another and regulate their emotions.

Students are now becoming more confident identifying how they are feeling and which zone they are in. Please feel free to speak to your children about the zones, as it can be a really useful tool for discussing emotions at home as well as at school.

Work will continue within the classrooms after Easter as students begin to identify which 'tools' are most useful for them, and become confident using their tools to regulate their emotions.
